
<u>PHOTO CONTEST FOR 2015 BCHS CALENDAR</u> (Theme: Homes of Bland County)

Bland County History as recorded in the Bland Messenger, January 1964

The Bland County Historical Society has a large collection of Bland County Messengers donated from numerous sources over the years. Below is a sampling of the information available in the Bland Messenger in January, 1964. It is worth noting that there was no mention of snow. It must have been a quiet January.

January 2, 1964

- The Bland County Development Corporation held a meeting at the Bland Hosiery Mill on December 21, 1963. Mr. Curry reported \$273,000 in gross business with a \$67,000 payroll, all of which goes to Bland County residents with the exception of 1 man from out of state.
- Mr. and Mrs. Grover Wright celebrated their Golden Wedding Anniversary with a dinner at their home." A picture cutting their anniversary cake and guest list completed the article.

January 9, 1964

- Two Bland County Senior students were awarded Good Citizenship Awards by the Wilderness Road Chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution. Ronald Pauley and Dorothy Penley were chosen for their "outstanding service, leadership, dependability, and patriotism.
- Road Association Issues New Tourists Information Map, Thousands of Copies being Distributed In 5 States. This was the lead headline for Jan 9th's paper followed by several columns about the information to be sent to the targeted group.

January 16, 1964

- County Chief Fire Warden, G.R. "Park" Brown reported a total of 16 forest fires burned in 1963, damaging 640 acres. He pointed out that 99% of this year's forest fires were caused by human carelessness, the chief causes being smokers or brush and trash burners.
- Pat Jennings, Congressional Representative, reported on the 2nd session of the 88th Congress and the Health Insurance Act (what we know now as Medicare??) being proposed to establish a program under Social Security. (The Editorial Column was a diatribe on this proposal.)

January 23, 1964

- Headline: Thieves Break into Two Schools, Damage Heavy. In 2 separate events, thieves broke into the Bland School and stole \$62 and damaged doors and windows. A few days earlier there was a break-in at Bastian Elementary. Damage was done to doors, windows, locks on ice cream and milk coolers. The floor was littered with cartons and wrappings but there was also a large pot of beans on the stove. Mrs. Muncy, the principal, said, "I am sure grateful the thieves didn't decide to mess the floors with beans."
- Gospel sing for the March of Dimes scheduled for Sunday afternoon at the East Chapel Community Church beginning at 2pm. (Announcement)
- Park Drive-In Theatre at Pearisburg is showing "The Girl Can't Help It" in color, starring Tom Ewell and Jayne Mansfield. (Advertisement)

January 30, 1964

- Approval of a request for a loan of \$150,000 to replace the Bland High School Building that burned last year was tabled until the February meeting. Victor Gilley presented the need for immediate action by the board considering the time required for preliminary planning, approval from Richmond and construction.
- T.E. Mallory, County Agent, reported on 1963's agriculture progress despite the serious drought. He reported participating in 48 adult meeting, 84 4-H Club meetings, 728 office consultations, 878 farm visits and 1150 telephone calls.
