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## HISTORY OF BLAND HIGH SCHOOL

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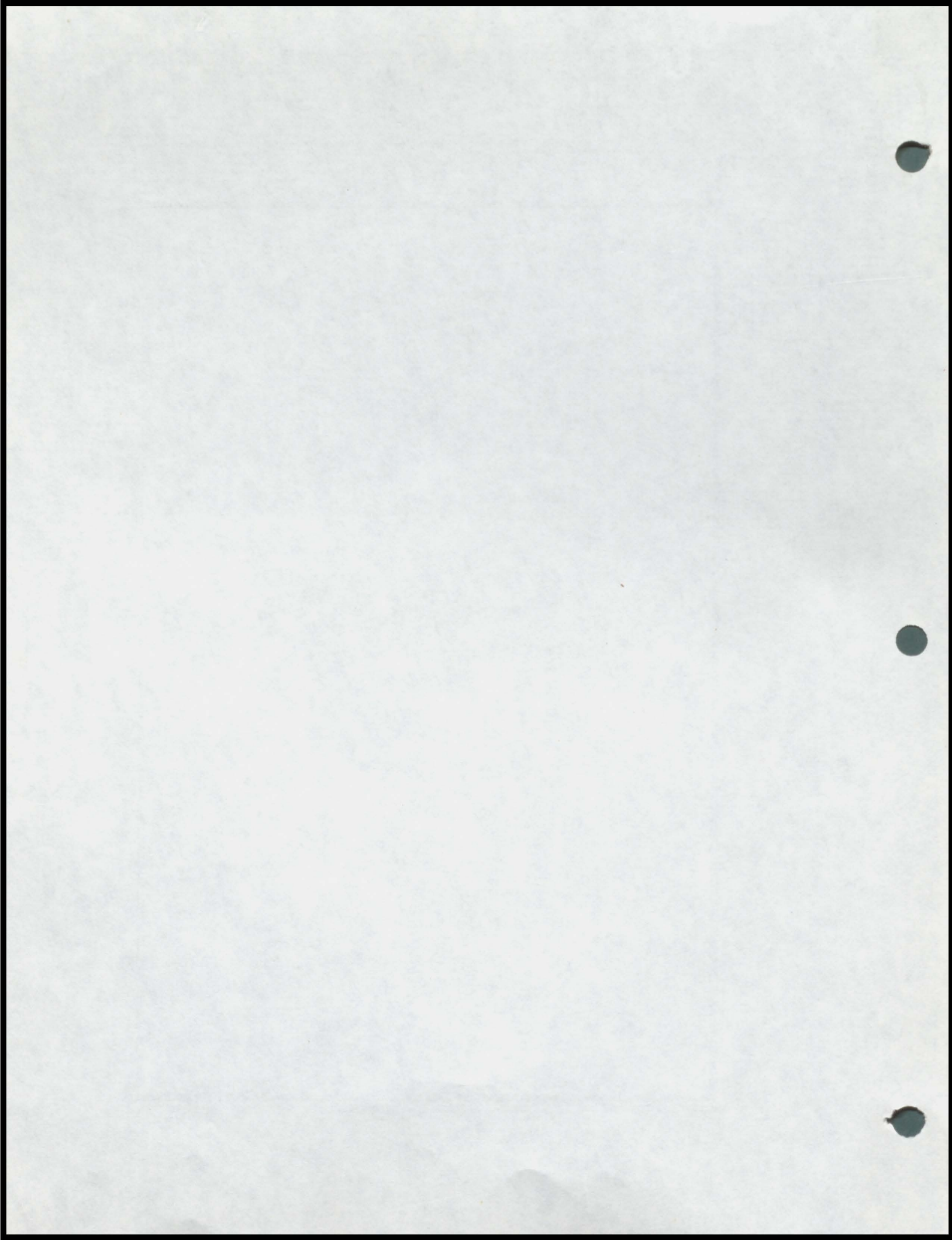
Bland School was made a three year high school in 1909-1910. The building was on Main Street, just above where Seddon Service Station now stands. Mr. D.H. Muncy of Suiter was superintendent, Miss Irene Larry was principal, and the graduates were: Miss Virginia Brown, Mrs. A.R. Porterfield, Mrs. Eugene Davidson and Miss Cate Dunn. Mr. J.T. Dunn, Mr. H.H. Bruce, Miss Noomi Wagner and Mr. Edgar Umbarger have served as principal between the years 1910-1922.

Mr. F.L. Dunn was superintendent from 1908 until 1920. In 1917 the building which we are now using was erected.

Dr. J.A. Wagner succeeded Mr. Dunn and is still serving as superintendent. It has been during his term that a four year accredited high school has been established. Mr. DeShazo was principal in 1922-1923 and that was the year that the school was first put on the accredited list. The graduates that year were: Nannie Rose Muncy, Marie Bird, Nora Morris, Mary Tickle, Roy Bird, Daniel Tickle, Park Brown and George Tickle. Mr. Lucas was principal the year following that, then Mr. C.E. Bones, Jr. of Palaski from 1924-1929; Mr. H.H. Bruce from 1929-1931; Mr. J.L. Mincheloe from 1931-1936.

In 1928 there were three teachers in the high school department. There was an average of thirty-five students and there were eight graduates; Only one bus was needed.

This year there are five teachers, one hundred thirty-one students and twenty-two graduates. We have three busses and they serve as six by making extra trips in order to accomodate the high school and grade students. There are now ten teachers and three hundred three students in the entire school.

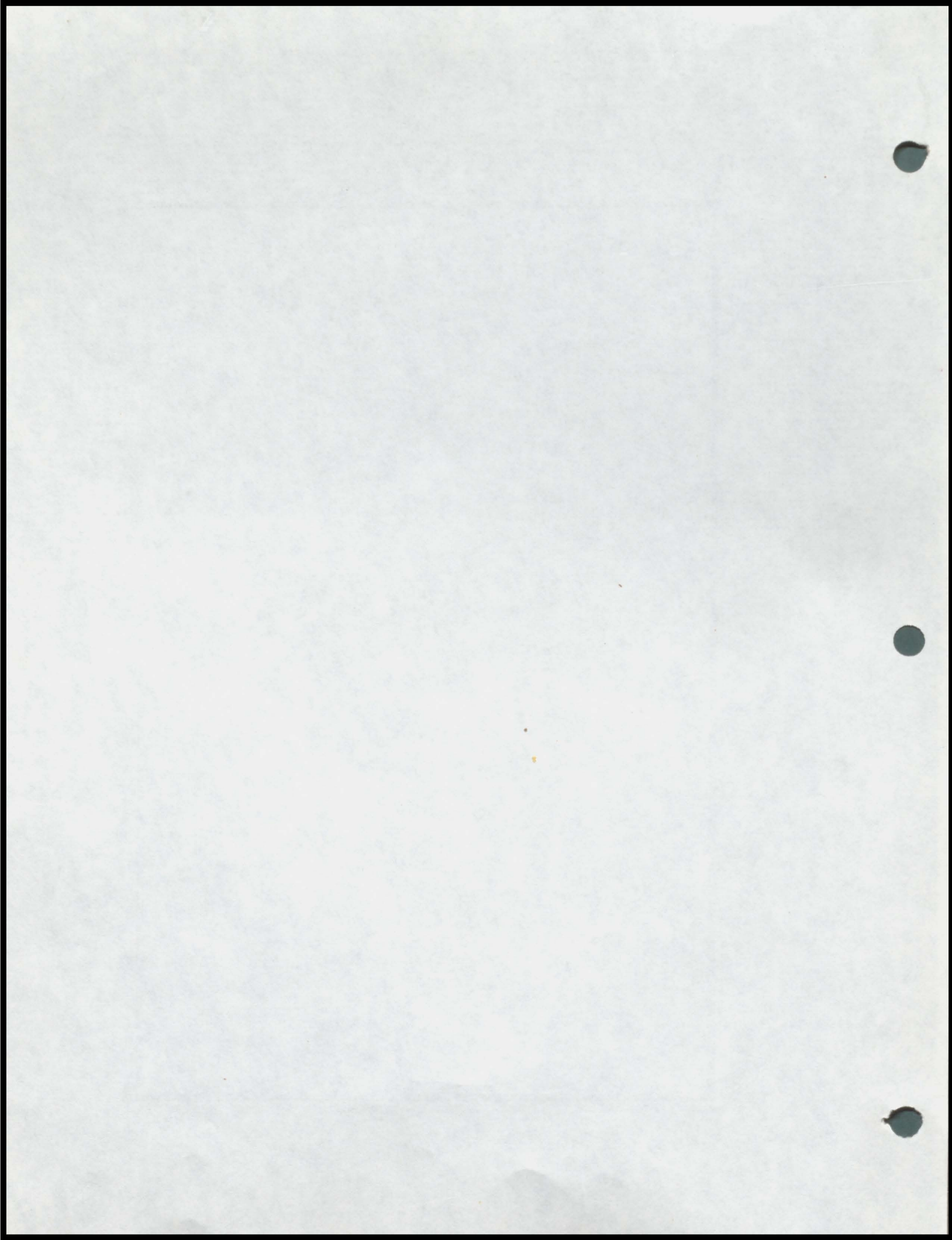
Soon we stepped into the sophomore room and found plenty of hard work before us, but we knew that we could never be young but once, so why not have our fling now?

Of the Class of Thirty-Six.

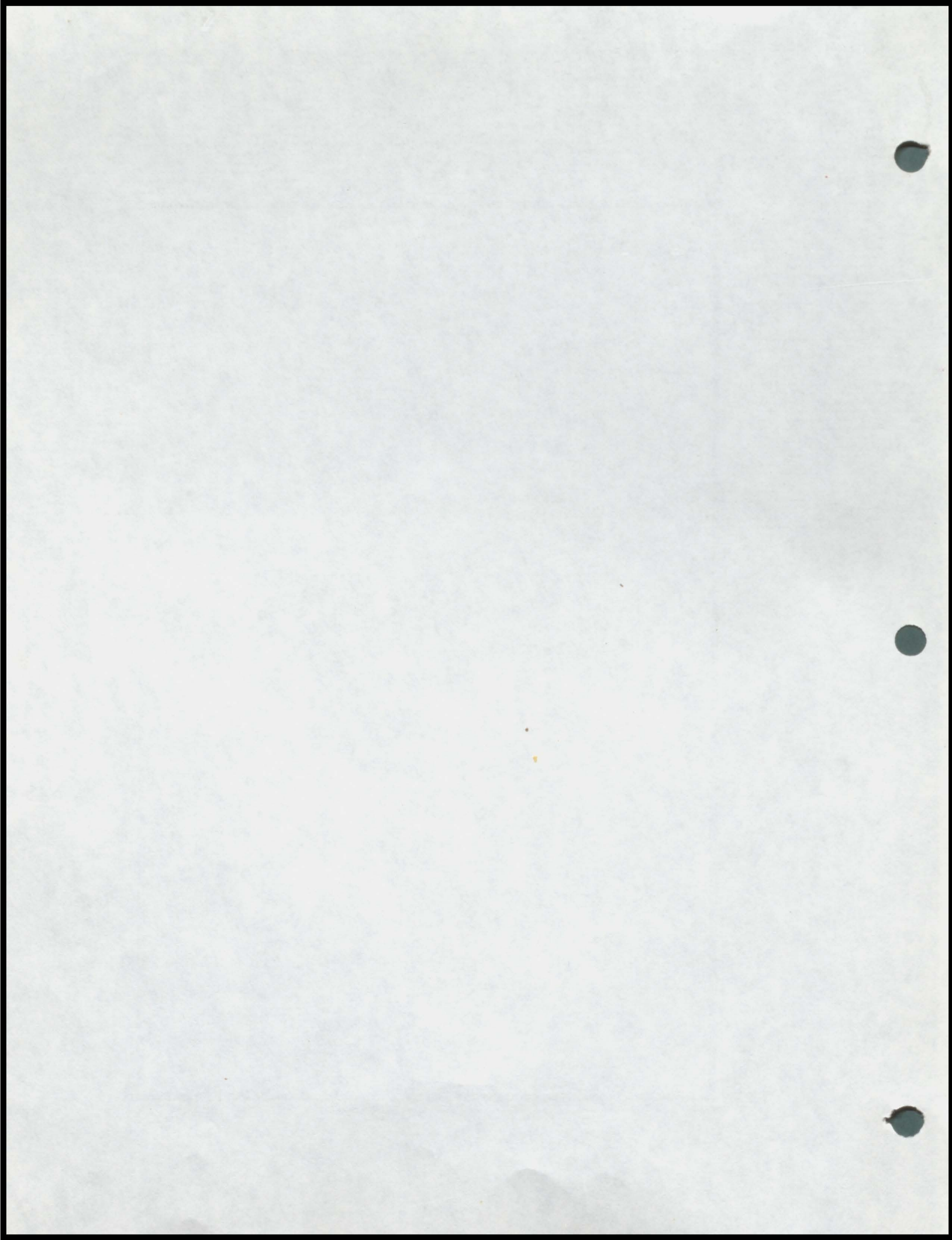
What! so much confusion!

When his lessons dragged behind.

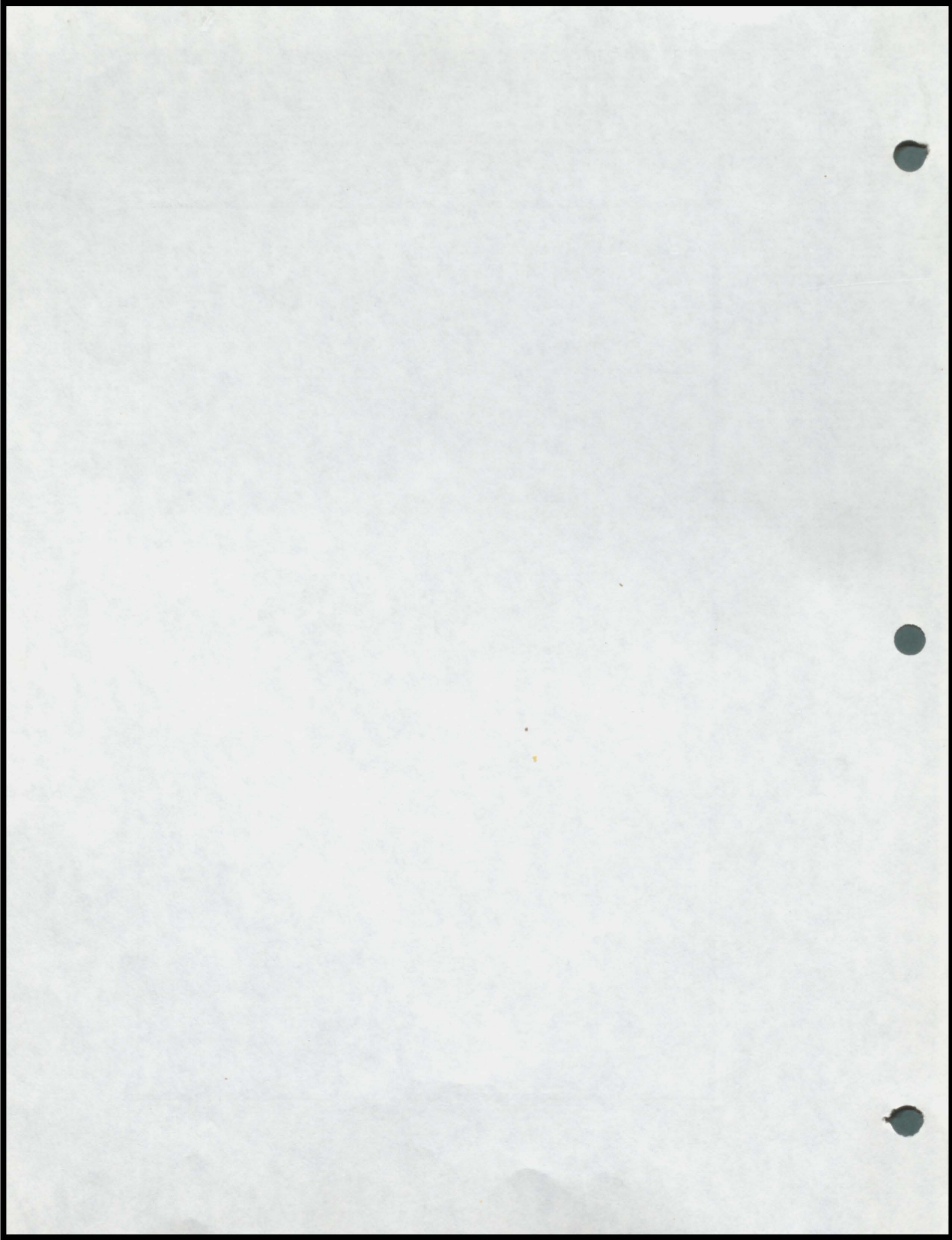
Sherman was admiring

"Oh", said the visitor, "I suppose you have not heard of the revised curricula of all the schools of Virginia."

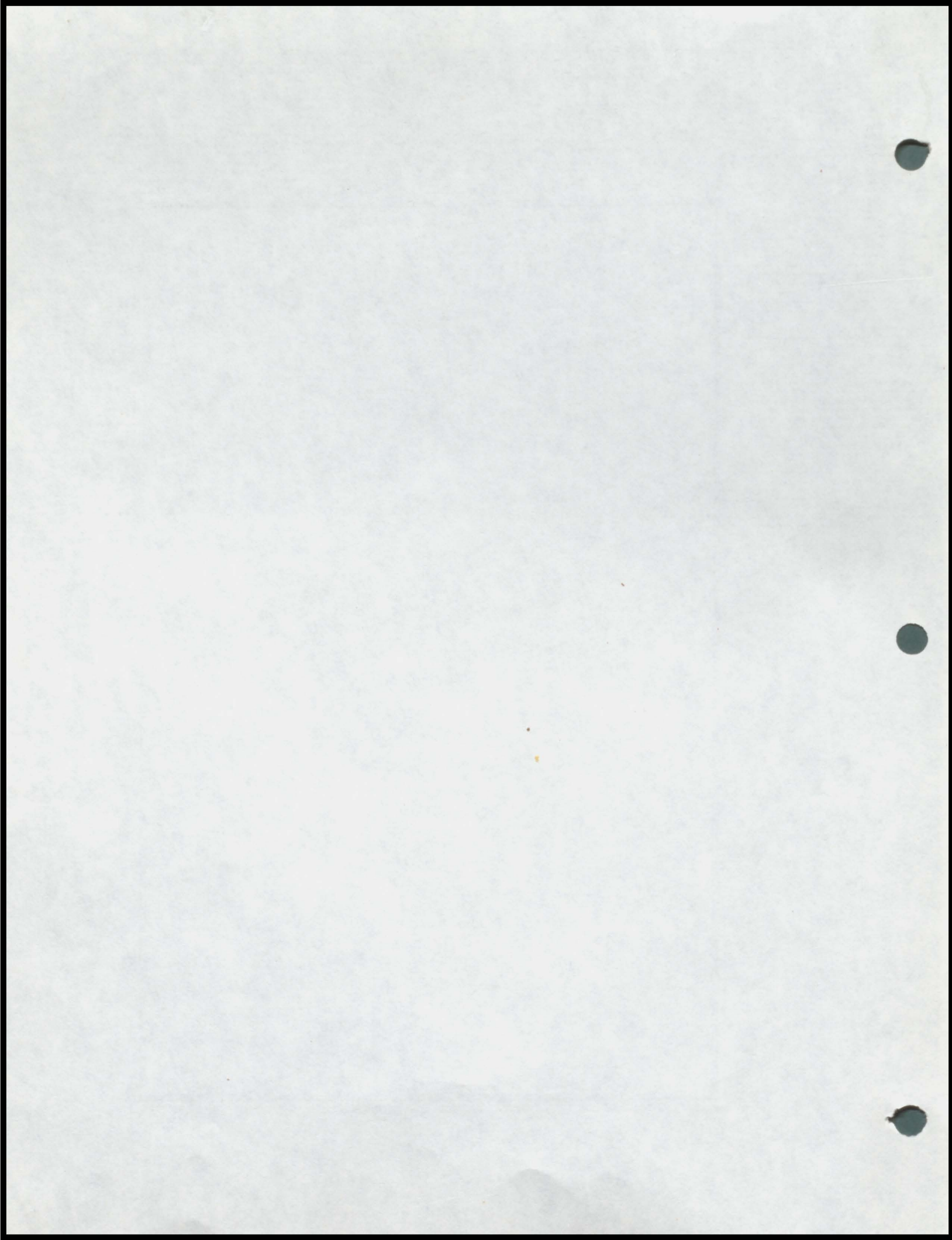
"Then" I exclaimed, "You are the curriculum?"

"I will concede the point" I answered gruffly. "Go on, who next?"

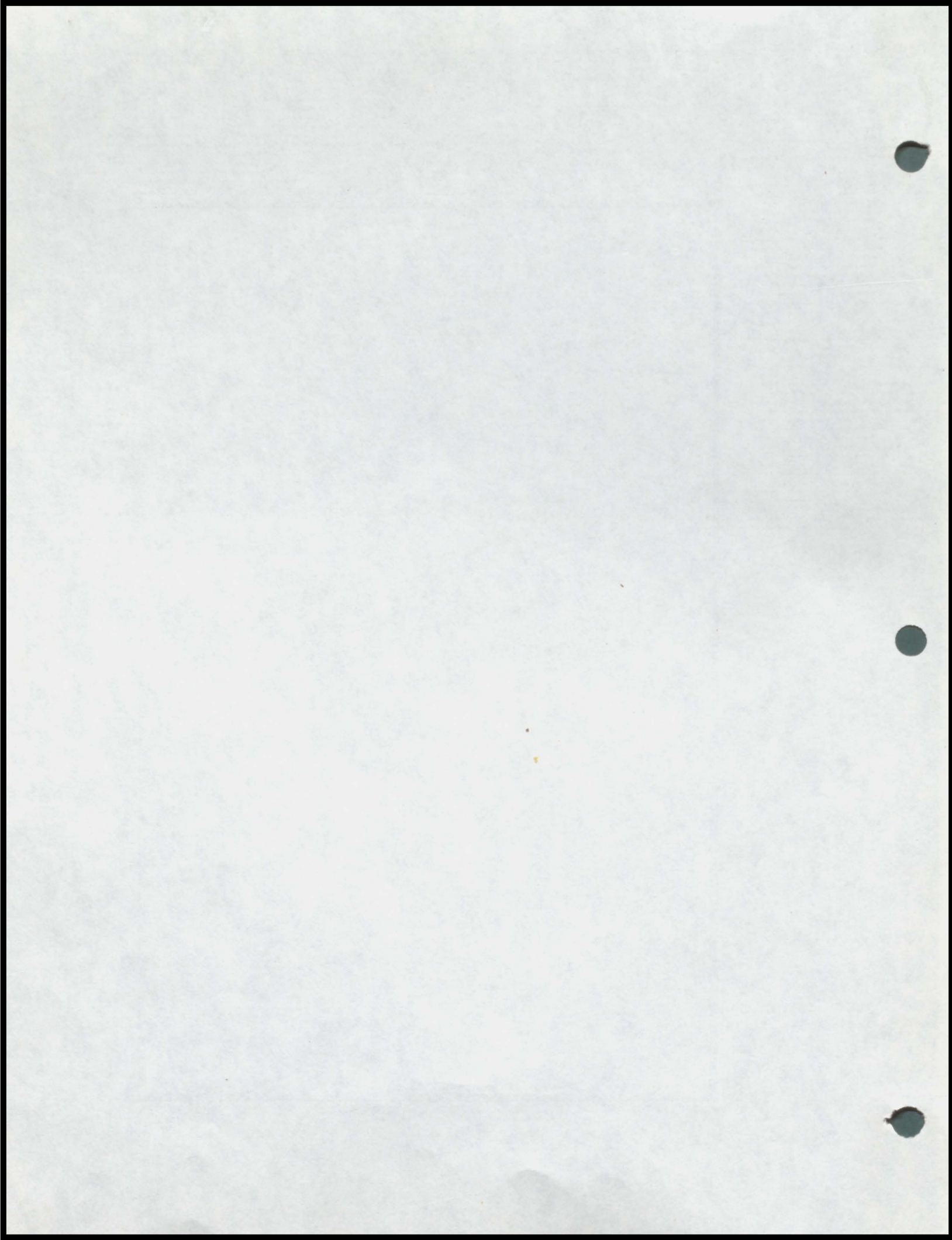
"J.D. Wyrick will run a large steam laundry in Chicago."

"Hasn't Miss Ashworth commended her accomplishments in government?" was the reply; Evelyn Hamilton will be very successful in selling life insurance."

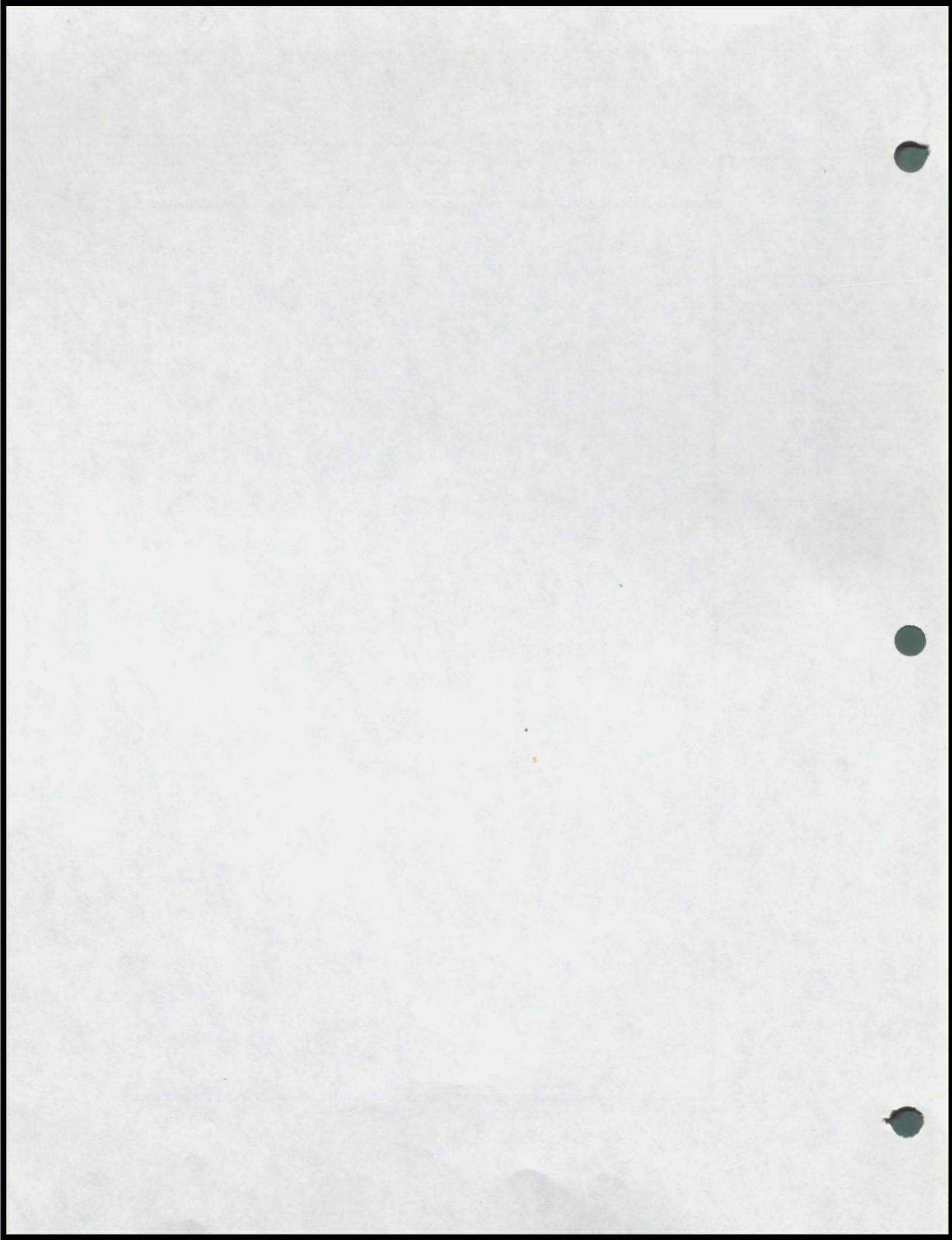
"That's one time I prophesy with you, because Evelyn always showed good business ability and a mathematical mind" I answered.

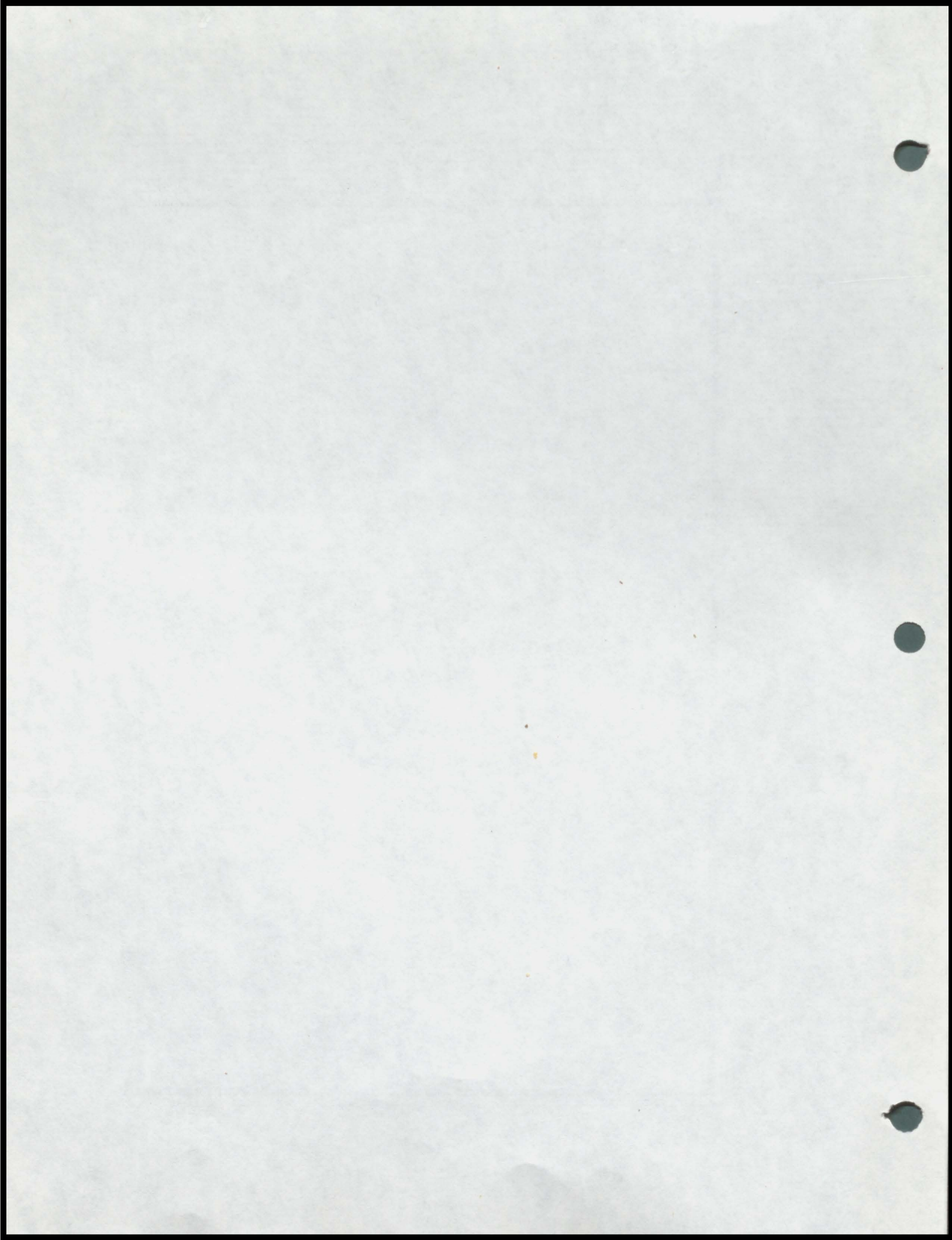
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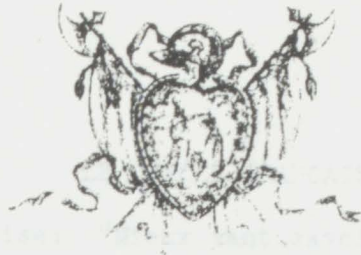


## BASEBALL, 1936

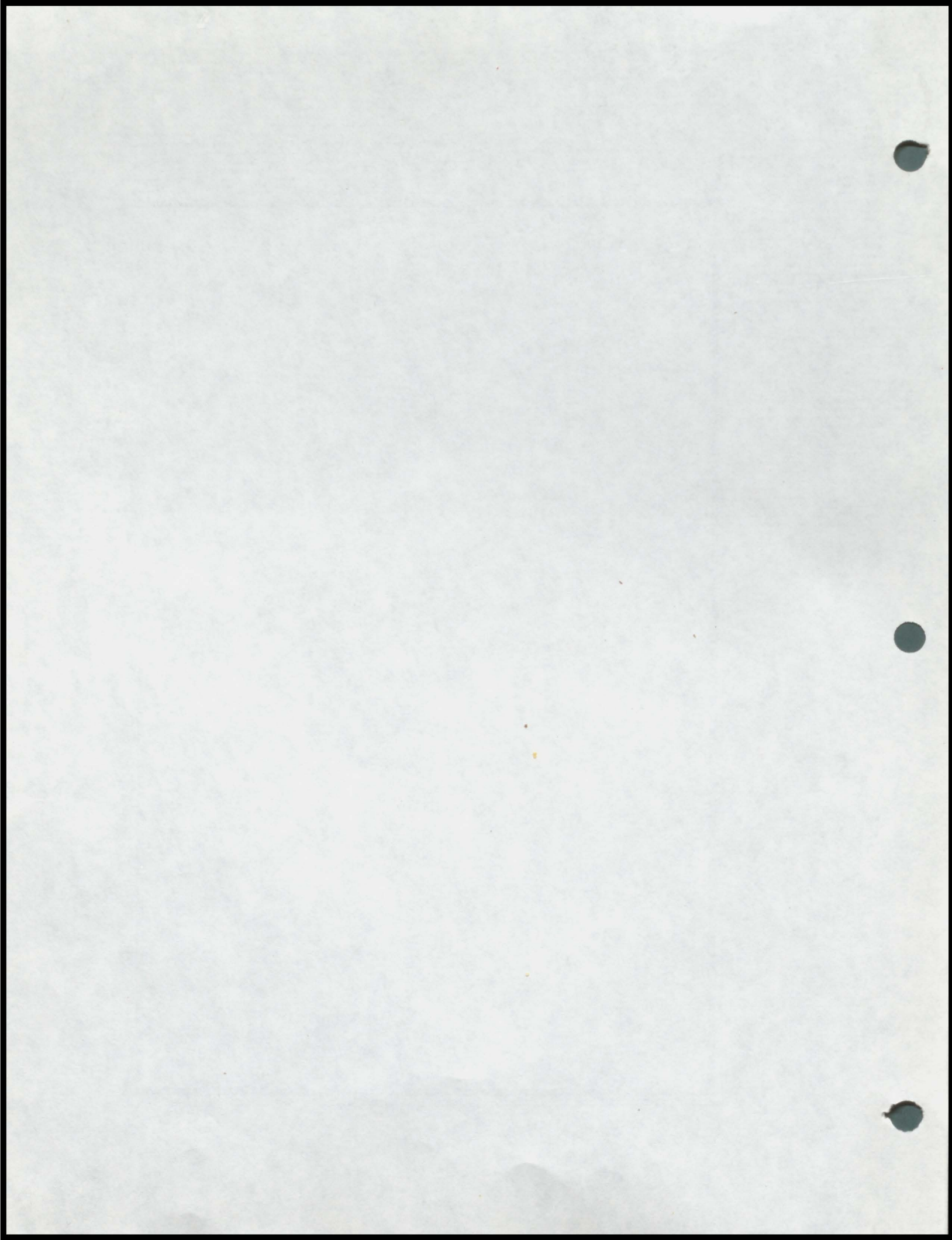
